## Daisy Farm Crafts

Crochet Cluster Stitch Infinity Scarf

## **MATERIALS**

2 skeins Patons Alpaca Blend (100 g/3.5 oz, 142 m/155 yds) or 3 skeins Patons Classic Wool Roving (100 g/ 3.5 oz, 109 m/120 yds) Size J/6.00mm hook, scissors, tapestry needle

## **STITCHES**

**Half Double Crochet (HDC):** YO, insert your hook, YO and pull up a loop, YO and pull through three loops on hook.

Half Double Crochet (HDC) Cluster: YO, insert your hook, YO and pull up a loop, YO insert your hook into the same space again, YO, pull up a loop, YO and pull through all loops on the hook.

Single Crochet (SC): Insert your hook, YO and pull up a loop, YO and pull through two loops on hook.

## **PATTERN**

Chain 170 (or any even number).

**Row 1:** In the third chain from the hook, work 1 half double crochet (HDC). HDC to the end of the chain. Chain 2 and turn.

**Row 2:** HDC across the whole row, working in the front two loops only (the chain 2 does not count as your first HDC). Chain 2 and turn.

**Row 3:** In the first stitch of the row below, work 1 HDC Cluster in the front two loops only. SC in the next stitch, working in the front two loops only, then work another HDC Cluster in front two loops only. Continue across the row, alternating front two loop SC and HDC Cluster. When you reach the end of the row, chain 2 and turn.

**Row 4:** HDC across the whole row, working in the front two loops only (when you are working into the SCs from the row below, there will only be one front loop to go through.) Chain 2 and turn.

Rows 5 - 6: Repeat Row 2.

Row 7: Repeat Row 3.

Row 8: Repeat Row 4.

**Rows 9 - 10:** Repeat Row 2.

Row 11: Repeat Row 3.

Row 12: Repeat Row 4.

**Rows 13 - 14:** Repeat Row 2.

When you finish the last row, you can either tie off and leave a long tail to sew the two sides of the scarf together with a tapestry needle, or you can slip stitch the two sides together.

If you decide to slip stitch them together, then you'll want to make sure that the backside of the scarf is facing outward so that you can turn it inside out after you're finished and the thicker seam will be on the inside.

Weave in all ends with a tapestry needle when finished.
